Hello and welcome to the first of our new-look AWACAN-ED Newsletters. Via our twice yearly newsletters we aim to keep everyone involved and up-to-date with the latest activities and news.

AWACAN-ED is an NIHR-funded Global Health Research Group which started in October 2021 and runs for 4 years. It follows on from the African Women Awareness of CANcer (AWACAN) project, which focussed on breast and cervical cancer awareness among women in Sub-Saharan Africa.

The AWACAN-ED team includes researchers from South Africa, Zimbabwe and the United Kingdom. We aim to advance the early diagnosis of cancer in Southern Africa by developing and evaluating electronic tools (e-Tools) to improve care-seeking and reduce healthcare delays. We will focus on cervical and breast cancer in women and colorectal cancer in men and women.

Research Update

Data Collection for Workstream 1 of the project is well underway in both South Africa and Zimbabwe. Teams are visiting clinics in the following locations:

- Mthatha, Eastern Cape, South Africa
- Cape Town, Western Cape, South Africa
- Bulawayo, Zimbabwe
- Harare, Zimbabwe

Overall, recruitment across all three cancers has exceeded 60% of the target.
